Register Now for Citizens' Academy Spring Session

Learn how your tax dollars are spent -- free course offers public insight into county government!

Charleston County is inviting residents into the classroom, and the subject is local government.

For residents who want to know where their tax dollars go, the Charleston County Citizens' Academy offers a free, in-depth course that provides an understanding of county government.

Citizens' Academy is a series of 12 classes taught by Charleston County Government employees and county elected officials.

The spring 2008 Citizens' Academy will be offered from 5:30-8:30 p.m. on Monday evenings from Feb. 25 through May 12. Classes are held in county government facilities. A graduation ceremony will be held on Tuesday evening, May 20, in County Council chambers during the 7 p.m. council meeting.

"The purpose of the academy is to introduce our citizens to the services and operations provided by Charleston County Government," said Linda Slater, who started the county's program in 2003. "More importantly, it is designed to help citizens understand the issues that drive decisions related to services, and to provide participants with a forum to learn, ask questions, and make comments to those responsible for spending their tax dollars."

Charleston County has been offering Citizens' Academy courses twice a year for the last five years. Topics include the county budgeting process, garbage and recycling, law enforcement, the court system, emergency services, planning and zoning, and much more.

"The course would be of value to neighborhood association leaders, business people, teachers, members of the media, and anyone who is a concerned and interested citizen," Slater said.

Citizens' Academy graduates are eligible for Continuing Education Units from the College of Charleston. Applicants accepted into the program will be expected to attend all 12 sessions. An optional all-day "field trip" to government facilities is scheduled for Friday, May 16. For those not able to attend an evening class, the fall 2008 course will be scheduled on Monday afternoons from 2-5 p.m.

Participants must be 18 years of age or older, and live or work in Charleston County. The spring 2008 session is limited to 35 participants.
