

County opens residential food scrap drop site at Bees Ferry

The City of Charleston started its residential compost pilot program in January 2022, with support from grant funding. Over 900 households have joined the pilot so far, diverting over 30 tons of food scraps. Participants have said that adding more drop sites would improve the program and make composting more accessible. Now, Charleston County and the City of Folly Beach are partnering to expand the compost program.

On October 1, the County, along with Folly Beach, joined the City's existing residential food scrap drop site program, adding a new site at the Bees Ferry Convenience Center. To access the compost bins from Bees Ferry Road, continue past the convenience center. The food scrap drop site is located in the gravel parking lot adjacent to the scale house.

Composting helps reduce harmful greenhouse gas emissions from landfills and helps protect air and water from pollution. By nourishing the soil, compost also helps stormwater absorption. Finally, compost reduces the need for expensive chemical fertilizers, makes plants healthier and can be used without harming wildlife or ecosystem health.
